MAYOR'S MESSAGE MARCH

I want to welcome Dieter Koelling as the newest member of Montvale's governing body. Dieter was selected from a list provided to the Council by the County Committee to take the seat vacated by Theresa Cudequest in January. Dieter is a retired, 20-year-career veteran of the Green Berets/U.S. Special Forces who was born and raised in Montvale and we all look forward to his contributions going forward.

On Feb. 12, Superior Court Judge William Meehan handed down his decision on the litigation concerning the redevelopment of the DePiero's farm property. The ruling upheld the master plan and zoning changes challenged in the lawsuit brought by A&P, Kevin and Daniel Roe, and Linda and John Bongardino. The 13-page decision simply states the borough was within its purview with all the actions taken on behalf of the changes and that the plaintiffs did not make its case concerning any of those actions. There is an appeal process and the plaintiffs have 45 days from the date of the decision to file an appeal. If the decision is appealed, estimates are that it will take approximately one year to go through the process.

We have had several snow events this winter and the cold has been numbing. The Pascack Valley DPW has been doing a great job clearing the roads and the cooperation offered by the residents has made a huge difference. Staying off the roads until they are clean has contributed greatly to the overall success of keeping our roads clean. Thank you for your calls and comments in support of the job they are doing. Complaints are almost nonexistent and the response to

those complaints has been quick and professional.

The 2015 budget should be approved about the time this newsletter is printed. Our goal was to keep taxes as level as possible while providing for a litany of the borough's needs. The big ticket items this year will be a new fire truck, a \$1 million road paving program, new software for the police and staff, a new lightning detection system, a new police car, repair of the Pascack Brook, a new first response vehicle for Tri-Boro Ambulance, a new senior van/bus, and the preliminary expenses associated with the new firehouse. These expenses amount to roughly \$3 million and would historically be part of a municipal bond, placing more debt on our shoulders. However, because of our diligent watch over our spending habits and revenue streams over the last five or six years, we have amassed a healthy surplus. This means we will be able to just write a check and be done with it saving any bonding for the long term projects like the construction of the firehouse where we can be creative in combining

some debt which will allow us to keep the taxes as level as possible year after year.

Our condolences are extended to the family of Bill Lange. Bill was a 41-year member of the Montvale Zoning Board. He was also a longtime crossing guard beloved by the school children and the Montvale Police Department. He will be missed.

Finally, I want to thank Hackensack University Medical Center for committing to sponsor this year again another four issues of My Montvale. We appreciate their participation which allows us to provide a newsletter every month throughout the year.

Hello Montvale:

As we head into April, the joggers, bicyclists and walkers will be out in full force again on our streets and sidewalks. Use caution driving. Give ample room to the other users of the roadways. Beware of children at play as the weather warms.

As a reminder, home and business burglar alarms must be registered with the Police Department. You can download a registration form on the Borough website, www.montvale.org, or pick one up at the police station. You can also download Vacant Home Registration and Firearms Permit forms, and connect to the Orange and Rockland Street Light repair via a link on the website.

We have had more thefts from autos of unlocked cars in driveways. Lock your cars when not in them and do not leave the starter fobs in the car.

Credit card fraud victims have been popping up all over the area. It is impossible to prevent all credit card information theft, but there are steps you can take to minimize the risk or limit the damage.

- Delete cookies and auto-fill data when you visit web pages.
- Only use your card on trusted websites.
- Use reliable, updated anti-virus and anti-spam software. Do not use websites that your software tries to reject.



• Regularly monitor your credit card statement for any unauthorized payments. Many unauthorized payments may be for small amounts of money, which could be an attempt to see if a payment gets through, or the thieves hope you don't notice. Some payments may be to a service the thieves hope you will be uncomfortable confronting such as a massage parlor or pornography website. Other payments may go to what appears to be a religious or medical charity the thieves hope you will not want to contest. In every case of an unauthorized payment, contact your bank and credit card company to stop the payment.

ADULT PROGRAMS

18+ COMPETITIVE BASKETBALL

Residents 18 years of age and older can participate in this competitive style pick-up game format. This program began in January and will continue through May. Games are played on Wednesday nights from 8 to 10 p.m. in the Fieldstone School gymnasium. Fee: \$50 for residents; \$75 for non-residents.



30+ BASKETBALL

This program is for men and women 30 years of age and older and held on Monday evenings from 8 to 10 p.m. in the Memorial School gymnasium. This pick-up game style program began in September and will continue through May. Fee: \$75 for residents; \$95 for non-residents if space permits.



HATHA YOGA



Yoga will increase flexibility, physical strength and energy. Yoga will also improve concentration, emotional stability and the ability to relieve stress through relaxation. Two one-day/week classes will be offered in the Recreation Center. The first class will meet Monday evenings from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. beginning March 23.

The second class will meet Friday mornings from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. beginning March 27. Registration will take place on the first session of each class. Residents and non-residents 18 years of age or older are invited to participate. High school students may participate if registered by an adult. A mat or towel should be brought to each class. Fee: \$80 for residents; \$100 for non-residents for this eight-week class. Instructor: Debra Broadman.

TAEKWON-DO

TALKIN' BASEBALL

If talking about baseball as it was in years past is your thing, please join us at our monthly meetings. The group meets the first Wednesday of each month at 8:15 p.m. in the Recreation Center (entrance is behind the community center). There is no fee for this program.

ADULT VOLLEYBALL

This program is for men and women 18 years of age and older. Adult volleyball is held in the Memorial School Gymnasium from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. The program began in January and will be held on Tuesday evenings through May. Fee: \$50 for residents; \$75 for non-residents.



TENNIS LESSONS

Looking to improve your tennis game? This program will be offered through the Montvale Recreation Dept. but taught by Bill Bess of Tennis Dynamics. Lessons will be taught for the beginner and the intermediate player. Instruction will be limited to a maximum of eight participants per group. Classes will be offered for kindergarteners through adults. Two separate days of lessons will be offered independently of one another. The cost for the six-week program (one day/week) is \$80/person for residents and \$120/person for non-residents. Lessons will be given at the Memorial Drive tennis courts. Please note the courts will be reserved for lessons during the length of the program. Monday classes will begin on May 4. Saturday classes will begin May 9. Loaner rackets will be provided for those people that do not own their own racket but are interested in playing. To register, please read tennis registration below.

TENNIS

A magnetic locking system is installed on the court gates of both the Memorial Drive and Chestnut Ridge tennis courts. This system has proven to be an effective way to reduce the number of non-regis-

tered people using our courts. Each year residents who wish to use the courts must register to receive their new access card.

ROUND ROBIN TENNIS

The courts are reserved for this program on Thursday evenings from 6 to 9 p.m. on Memorial Drive. All registered men and women are eligible to participate. There is NO FEE for this program which runs from mid-May through the end of August. You may register for the round robin when you register for tennis passes and/or lessons. If the program is not running, the courts are open to all registered participants.

BUGS AND FROGS SEW FUN

Using the latest computerized sewing machines with three speed controls to accommodate the age and skill level of your future designers, girls AND boys will discover the fun of sewing. 

Lt. Bruce Piatt, our former Emergency Management Coordinator, has retired. My name is Marly Frasciello and I have assumed the responsibilities associated with this position. I currently work in the Montvale Police Department as an administrative assistant to the Chief of Police. Sgt. Jason Szabo of the Montvale Police Department is the new Deputy Emergency Management Coordinator. We look forward to providing you with all the detailed information you may need in case of an emergency.



Please remember, no matter how prepared you are for an emergency, everyone should visit the Bergen County Office of Emergency Management website, bcoem.org, and review the vast resources at your disposal. They have programs and personnel to assist families, senior citizens, pets, the disabled and are adding more every day. There are links to every local, state, and federal agency there to help you in your time of need.

You have to do your part by doing two things:

First and foremost you need to stay informed. In the time of an emergency Montvale authorities will use several methods to broadcast alerts, information and instructions.

The Montvale Police Department uses its two social media accounts: twitter.com/montvalepd or [Facebook/montvalepolice](https://facebook.com/montvalepolice). The

Office of Emergency Management uses a Reverse Phone Alerting System giving you a recorded message directly to your home or cell phones. You can add additional phone numbers or block business or fax lines, all by accessing the SwiftReach portal at www.bcoem.org. In May, you can access the Montvale Office of Emergency Management on Facebook and twitter. We will have further information on this in the May newsletter.

Second, you need to take the first step.
