MAYOR'S MESSAGE MARCH

With winter almost behind us and all the snow melting and temperatures changing, expect potholes to begin showing up, especially after rain. When water seeps into cracks on the road's surface and is combined with the vibration of traffic it causes the asphalt to fail. The most common cause is the freeze/thaw cycle. The ice/snow melts during the day, filling cracks with water. At night the water freezes and expands, popping out the asphalt. The PVDPW is working diligently to fill as many potholes as they can. Please do your part and report potholes you see on your roads.

As part of our communication strategy, we will have a Town Hall meeting on March 31 at 7 p.m. at our Borough Hall to present updates to the public on key projects in

town, detail the state of the Borough both financially and operationally and address all questions and issues. We will have our professionals on hand to address specific issues such as road improvements, taxes, our master plan and upcoming activities. Related to the communication strategy, we will update our website to be more intuitive and functional with a much easier accessibility to timely information.

I have been spending much of my time dealing with our corporate office buildings and their future in our town. Proactively, we introduced a new ordinance to create an Economic Growth and Retention Commission that will be actively seeking new tenants globally and working closely with current corporate tenants to ensure closed loop communication.

Why all the obvious focus on corporate tenants? The mega suburban office building of the 80s is not viable anymore. Companies are



Mike Ghassali Mayor restructuring their workplaces, reengineering and shrinking their real estate footprints. They no longer require the large space typically found in suburban office campuses. Landlords who were once capable of supporting a single tenant building now find themselves converting these buildings to multi-tenant use. Our challenge: increased real estate vacancy in Montvale and aggressive developers seeking to build high-density housing. These are the facts we are dealing with and we have to face the reality our landscape is changing. My promise is that the public will be informed and informed early enough to have a say in how our town will look in the next 5-10 years.

We also started a Mayor's Wellness Program. The credit goes to Councilwoman Leah LeMonica for introducing

this program, and I am gladly supporting it. Once the weather warms up, we will set up a day in the week to walk around town with anyone who wants to walk with us. This gives us a chance to talk one on one with the residents and get to know everyone, all while walking and doing a good low-impact exercise. More to come on this. I look forward to this program.

These first three months in office have been very exciting and interesting. Meeting many residents and addressing their issues seems to increase my passion and feeling that I am making a difference. I sincerely appreciate all the well wishes and support; many residents offered to volunteer to work for the town and I will be reaching out to them in the next few weeks. We have had more thefts from autos of unlocked cars in driveways. LOCK your cars when not in them and do not leave the starter fobs in the car.

Credit card fraud victims have been popping up all over the area. It is impossible to prevent all credit card information theft, but there are steps you can take to minimize the risk or limit the damage.

• Delete cookies and auto-fill data when you visit web pages. • Only use your card on trusted websites.

• Use reliable, updated anti-virus and anti-spam software. Do not use websites that your software tries to reject.

• Regularly monitor your credit card statement for any unauthorized payments. Many unauthorized payments may be for small amounts of money – it may be an attempt to see if a payment gets through or the thief may hope you don't notice. Some payments may be to a service that the thieves hope you will be uncomfortable confronting, like a massage parlor or pornography website. Other payments may go to what appears to be a religious or medical charity the thieves hope you will not want to contest. In every case of an unauthorized payment contact your bank and credit card company to stop the payment.

MONTVALE RECREATION DEPARTMENT

ADULT PROGRAMS:

30+ BASKETBALL

This program is for men and women 30 years of age and older and held on Monday evenings from 8 to 10 p.m. in the Memorial School gymnasium. The pick-up game style program began in September and will continue through May 2016. Fee: \$75 for residents; \$95 for nonresidents if space permits.

HATHA YOGA

Yoga will increase flexibility, physical strength and energy. Yoga will also improve concentration, emotional stability and the ability to relieve stress through relaxation. Two one-day/week classes will be offered in the Recreation Center. The first class will meet Monday evenings from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m., beginning March 21. The second class will meet Friday mornings from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m., beginning April 1. Registration will take place on the first session of each class. Residents and non-residents 18 years of age or older are invited to participate. High School students may participate if registered by an adult. A mat or towel should be brought to each class. Fee: \$80 for residents; \$100 for non-residents for this eight-week class. Instructor: Debra Broadman.

TENNIS LESSONS

Looking to improve your tennis game? This program will be offered through the Montvale Recreation Department but taught by Bill Bess of Tennis Dynamics. Lessons will be taught for the beginner and the intermediate player. Instruction will be limited to a maximum of eight participants per group. Classes will be offered for kindergarteners-adults. Two separate days of lessons will be offered independently of one another. The cost for the six-week program (one day/week) is \$80/person for residents and \$120/person for non-residents. Lessons will be given at the Memorial Drive tennis courts. Please note the courts will be reserved for lessons during the length of the program. Monday classes will begin on May 2. Saturday classes will begin May 7. Loaner rackets will be provided for those people who do not own their own racket but are interested in playing.

TENNIS REGISTRATION

A magnetic locking system is installed on the court gates of both the Memorial Drive and Chestnut Ridge tennis courts. This system has proven to be an effective way to reduce the number of non-registered people using our courts. Each year residents who wish to use the courts must register to receive their new access card.

ROUND ROBIN TENNIS

The courts are reserved for this program on Thursday evenings from 6 to 9 p.m. on Memorial Drive. All registered men and women are eligible to participate. There is NO FEE for this program. The program runs from mid May through the end of August. You may register for the round robin when you register for tennis passes and/or lessons. If the program is not running, the courts are open to all registered participants.

ADULT VOLLEYBALL

This program is for men and women 18 years of age and older. Adult volleyball will be held in the Memorial School Gymnasium "B" from 8 to 10 p.m. The program began in January and will be held on Tuesday evenings through May. Fee: \$50 fee for residents and \$75 for non-residents.

MONTVALE BOARD OF HEALTH

REMEMBER TO LICENSE YOUR PETS

The Montvale Board of Health, in conjunction with Tyco Animal Control, would like to remind pet owners that all dogs and cats within the borough are required to obtain a license each year. Animal license forms can be found on the Montvale website, www.montvale.org or at Borough Hall.

License applications may be mailed or you can come in person to Borough Hall during normal business hours. Please bring rabies certificate with you at time of registration. In order to obtain a license your pet's rabies vaccine must be valid to Nov. 1, 2016. A neutered/ spayed animal license is \$18, non-neutered/spayed \$21. Pet owners 55 years and old pay \$10.

Pet owners are reminded that an unlicensed animal is illegal in the Borough and could cause consequences to owners. A \$250 fine per Board of Health ordinance is possible.
