Police Department

In October there were numerous reports of "creepy clown" activity throughout the east coast including Bergen County. Reports of killings by "creepy clowns" were a hoax that copycats and pranksters perpetuated by wearing clown costumes and standing at the edge of wooded areas near roadways, hoping to be spotted, or in some cases, out in public wearing clown masks looking for attention. In Fairlawn, New Jersey, a group of teenagers were driving around trying to scare people by wearing clown masks and aggressively following other motorists with the intent of frightening them. Those teens were found, arrested and charged. It is not acceptable to intentionally put others in unnecessary fear for personal amusement. In some circumstances it may even be criminal.

Phone and cyber scams continue and probably will increase as the holidays approach. Senior Citizens beware, as you are often targeted. But the scams come at everyone.

Some common scams that prey on greed include a "certified check" or a "bank check" is sent to you because you won something – a lottery, a contest, or the promise of a big payday if you help a "victim" out. The scam asks you to wire money to an out of area Western Union office and they tell you to keep the extra money from the "check" you received. The check looks authentic and your bank may even deposit it for you. But it is a fake. It will ultimately bounce and you will get stuck with the fees. You will never be able to recover the funds sent via Western Union.

Craigs List scammers use a similar tactic in goods transactions. They send a "check" that is more than the cost of the item offered for sale, and ask the victim to wire the difference back to them by Western Union. They may even offer the seller to keep a little extra for themselves. The check is deposited. It takes a week before it is returned as fraudulent, and the wired money is gone and never recovered. The item for sale was never picked up.

Other scams prey on your emotions. A caller wakes you at night claiming to be your child or grandchild who was just arrested in a foreign country and needs bail sent immediately to secure their safety. A caller claims to have your relative or friend kidnapped and demands ransom. The caller states that they are from the IRS and you are in deep trouble for improper tax returns, demanding money or credit card information to be given over the phone. Each one is a scam. If ever in doubt call the police for a confirmation. DO NOT send any money. DO NOT give out any personal information or credit card information to strangers over the phone.
