New Jersey's white -tailed deer and Lyme disease

New Jersey's white tailed deer, in addition to impacting agricultural and ornamental plantings, harbor disease. They have reached problematic numbers and harbor an abundance of Ixodes ticks, the culprit in Lyme disease. Although these ticks are no larger than a small apple seed, they attach to animal hosts such as mice and deer and thus can be spread to humans by attachment. Fortunately, there are chemicals that can be applied to plantings that prevent tick infestation.

Preventative measures against deer ticks exposure include wearing insect repellant when outdoors, checking body for ticks daily, showering soon after outdoors and calling your health care provider at the first appearance of fever or rash.

Lyme disease is diagnosed if there is a history of possible exposure, rash and fever, and laboratory tests are positive. It is treated with antibiotics in the early stages. Currently there is no vaccine available. Thus, it is the educated consumer who is proactive in prevention measures. Everyone is encouraged to be aware of the steps toward keeping this disease in abeyance.

Flu Vaccination Program

Key Information

- This year we will be offering a Quadrivalent vaccine which protects against four different flu virus strains as well as a High Dose vaccine (if available from manufacturer) for those 65 years of age or older-the higher dose allows for older individuals to develop a better immune response to the fluvirus. The cost is \$ 35 for the High Dose vaccine for those not covered by Medicare.
- Regular Medicare participants must bring their Medicare Part B card for us to bill Medicare .
- The vaccine costs \$ 25, we do not accept insurance (cash/check only, no credit cards). This cost also applies to those who have a Medicare HMO (Medicare Advantage).
- Children between the ages of 3 and 17 can be vaccinated only if parent or guardian is present.
- Some children between the ages of 3 and 8 will need to receive a second dose, if this is their firsttime receiving the flu vaccination .
- The vaccine for children is Preservative Free.
- If you are pregnant, please bring a note from your obstetrician.

Police Department

School is back in session. Traffic will increase and school children will be walking to school, standing on street corners waiting for buses and crossing the parking areas near our schools. Use extra caution as you drive through these areas. Obey the posted traffic and parking regulations in the school areas.

School parents should follow the drop-off and pick-up regulations at the schools. To help alleviate traffic in the school parking areas, parents should car pool or have the children walk to school. Crossing guards are posted on Grand Avenue at Kinderkamack Road, at Railroad Avenue, and a police officer is posted at Grand Avenue at Memorial Drive. Crossing guards are also posted at the gate on Memorial Drive and Bayberry Drive (the rear gate) as well as at two additional crossing locations on Memorial Drive.

Memorial School: Construction of the new Firehouse has begun. To accommodate the firetrucks that are housed in the DPW building until completion of the new facility, parking along on Memorial Drive southbound closest to Grand Avenue has been eliminated to allow firetrucks to exit. This means less parking. The school drop-off lane will still be in operation in the morning. There is no parking or drop-off in front of the DPW building or in the rear of the firehouse construction area. These are active areas for construction equipment, trucks, and responding firefighters. This area needs to be kept clear. It is dangerous for children to be walking in this area. Tickets will be written to violators.

Attention Pascack Hills Football fans: PHHS is scheduled to have several night games under the lights at the school. To accommodate the neighbors in the Akers Avenue area, there will be NO PARKING on Akers Avenue for the games. Parking for the game will be in the front school parking lot and fans will take the walkway to the field. Handicap parking will still be at the Superintendent's parking lot on Akers Avenue.

REPORT ANIMAL BITES TO THE POLICE

It is not a pleasant thought but one day you might be out for a leisurely walk and encounter a dog that appears friendly, but as you reach to pet it, it nips at your hand slightly puncturing the skin. This is a common scenario, as, according to the CDC, approximately 4.5 million dog bites occur each year in the United States.


Would you know what to do if you were in this situation? The Montvale Board of Health would like to advise you that if you are bitten/scratched by a domestic animal (dog/cat):

- Obtain information about the pet including owner's name, phone, address, description of the animal, and its vaccination status.
- Clean the wound immediately with soap and water.
- Seek prompt medical attention from a physician or hospital emergency department.
- REPORT the bite to the police or local health department as soon as possible.

Once the health department has been contacted, the animal's rabies vaccination status will be verified to make sure it has a current rabies vaccine. If the animal has a current rabies vaccine it will be confined at home and observed by its owner for 10 days following the biting incident to ensure that it is free from rabies.

If you are bitten by a wild animal:

- Try to contain the animal while taking care to prevent additional bites and avoid exposure to saliva. Care should be taken to avoid damage to the animal's brain, which would be needed if it is to be sent to the state rabies laboratory for testing.
- CONTACT the police department for assistance.
- Seek medical attention. Human treatment to prevent rabies may be started immediately or delayed until the testing results are known. If the animal is not available for testing, the decision to start human treatment will be made by the bite victim and his/her physician based on recommendations by the local health department.



If your pet has bitten someone:

- Urge the victim to seek medical care immediately.
- Check with your veterinarian to see if your pet's vaccinations are up-to-date.
- IMMEDIATELY REPORT the bite to the police department or local health department.
- Report any unusual illness or behavior from your pet to the local health department and veterinarian.
- Don't let your pet free-roam and don't give your pet away. The animal must be available for observa-
- After the recommended observation period, have your pet vaccinated for rabies if it is overdue.



The next portion of your train excursion will take you deep into the heart of the West Virginia wilderness. The Salamander is built for the sharp twists and turns along side of the mountain, and leads itself to exotic views of wildlife, such as black bears, bobcats, and deer. Your ride ends at the remote Cheat Bridge, where your motorcoach will be waiting to take you to the final stretch of your rail exper ience. In the isolated town of Durbin, WV, you will board the Durbin Rocket, an open-air steam locomotive that rides beside the Greenbrier River. At the conclusion of the train tour, your group will enjoy dinner at one of the vintage Depots, with a chance to stop at the Rail & Trail Store before departing for nearby Elkins for a performance at the American Mountain Theatre. Th is 2-hour show features a mix of musical styles including country, southern, gospel, bluegrass, pop and patriotic music blending into the "Freshest Sound in the Mountains".

Day 3 - Following breakfast, check out and depart for a vis it to the Seneca Caverns. The caverns contain an abundance of flowing stone, gleaming creamy white stone that looks like a rock waterfall! The build up of minerals from this steady flow of water builds beauti ful monuments of stone that is as breathtaking as the mountain scenery above ground. Some of the various formations you will see include stalagmites, stalactites, columns, travertine, rim stone, and cave coral. After your exciting visit, depart for home with lasting memories of your trip to West Virginia .
