Free Rabies Clinic January 7, 2017

Reminder to Montvale Pet Owners: Montvale Board of Health is offering a free Rabies Vaccination Clinic on Saturday, January 7th at Montvale Senior & Community Center at One Memorial Drive, Montvale. Dr. Grady-Cohen will be administering vaccines to dogs from 10:00 am to 11:00 am and to cats from 11:00 am to 11:30 am. For your convenience, you can license your pet(s) at this time. License fee is \$18 for a spayed/neutered pet, \$21 for non spayed/neutered pet and pet owners that are 55 years and older the fee is \$10. Register your pet prior to February 28th and avoid a late fee.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT

As we begin to see the changes in our weather and the inevitable snow and ice that is sure to come, I would like to remind all residents that it is their responsibility to make sure that leaves are not left in the streets to be picked up by your landscape contractor at some future date. These leaves get washed into storm drains and require a lot of DPW time and money to clean out. This also assures that storm water systems operate properly when we have heavy rains during this time.

Once the snow starts to fall, please be reminded that it is the responsibility of the property owner to remove ice and snow from all sidewalks that front on all sides of your property. Sidewalks must remain passable at all times. While I know this can be a frustrating endeavor as plows go by and plow in what was just shoveled, it is important to remember that roadways are the priority in order for emergency vehicles to move about town. Removal of snow soon after a snowfall will reduce the potential for it to turn to ice and be more difficult to remove later on. By doing so, we will be able to provide safe and passable sidewalks during the upcoming winter. I thank everybody in advance for their efforts and cooperation. Police Department

We had a rash of burglaries from inside vehicles in December. The thefts happened in retail parking lots and a few in residential driveways. In the business sectors, car windows were smashed, the expensive pocketbook, purse, laptop, wallet or phone that had been left on the front seat of the car were taken. The car owners made it attractive for the thieves by leaving high-end items in plain sight. The residential thefts were crimes of opportunity. The cars were all left unlocked.

Several towns around us experienced cars stolen out of driveways or from open garages. All of the vehicles taken were equipped with key fob ignition with the fob left in the car or had ignition keys that were left in the car. Sophisticated car theft rings take advantage of the technology that makes operating the car more convenient to identify potential theft targets. The key fob emits a radio signal to the car with a code to allow the car to be started by pushing a button. Thieves use a type of amplified scanner to pick up those radio signals to determine if the fob has been left in the car. Once identified, the car is gone - taken to a chop shop or put in a shipping container for delivery to an overseas customer.

Defend yourself against these thefts. Do not leave anything of value in your vehicle, especially in plain sight to a passerby. Lock your car, including in your driveway. Take your keys or key fob out of the vehicle when you are not with it, including in your driveway and even inside your garage. If your vehicle has GPS capability, have it turned on to track the car if stolen. Don't make it easy for thieves to take advantage of you.



This program is for men and women 18 years of age and older. Adult volleyball will be held in the Memorial School Gymnasium "B" from 7:30-9:30 PM. The program began January 10, 2017 and will be held on Tuesday evenings through May. The fee for Residents is \$50 and the Non-resident fee is \$75.
